Our scripture readings these past weeks have often been about the church in its earliest days. Long before there were church buildings and sanctuaries, people gathered in homes to worship. Paul, the apostle, after starting a church and then leaving a city to start another, would write letters to stay in contact with the churches. And while Paul's letters sometimes have some interesting thoughts about the church and its members, I think he's definitely got the right idea with these parting words at the end of his letter to the church in Corinth, "Keep alert, stand firm in your faith, be courageous, be strong. Let all that you do be done in love." (1 Cor 16:13-14)

In the coming weeks and months, we'll be figuring out what this next phase of life looks like, in our personal lives as well as the life of the congregation. For our congregation, this will be true both because of the ongoing pandemic and because there will come a point at which you call a new settled pastor. As we discern how to move forward together, my hope is that we hold close Paul's words and let all that we do be done in love.

Many of you have asked how transitioning into Phase 1 will impact our church life together and particularly our worship services. The Council has developed a task force that will be reviewing guidelines and making recommendations as to how we move forward. Right now, we are not planning to resume in person worship in the immediate future. This stems primarily from a concern for everyone's safety. Gathering online and at a distance has been a vital part of our community and will continue to be going forward. When we do begin to make steps towards regathering in person, it will be just as

important to continue staying connected in this way for those who won't be able to join us in person

I Need to Tell My Story

While reading the booklet the Church made, "Being the Church – Testimonies of Faith" I saw through the words people wrote what the Church means to them. Growing up I was a member of the First Congregational Church in Malden, Ma. I sat in the balcony with the other teens. My parents at the time did not attend Church.

Then I thought, I need to tell my story. Yes, each month my story comes back to me. I'll share this with everyone for if you see a tear in my eye at Communion you will know why and the meaning behind it.

One Friday night at home mom served a whole chicken for the four of us. Mom cut up some of the pieces and put them on a platter. As the platter went around the table, my brother handed me the platter. I took a few pieces of white meat. My father bellowed, "NO! You take some of the dark meat or nothing!"

So, I put the white meat back and didn't take any other chicken. Father said, "Nothing to eat until you eat some of the dark meat." and he took my plate away. That was Friday night. Saturday, no breakfast, lunch or dinner. Sunday morning no breakfast.

I went to Church and it was Communion Sunday. When the ushers passed around the bread and wine cups, I said to my friend Dave, "FOOD!" He said, "What are you talking about?" I told him about the chicken episode and he said, "That's not right, your parents are not here, after services let's go down stairs for cake and cookies!"

This is why Communion means so much to me. Yes, I know the religious part of course, but for me, it has a very special meaning.

After the service we went down stairs, we had cake, cookies and milk. I was SO THANKFUL, that I stayed and helped clean up the tables. After I got home I told my mother what we did at Church. She said something like, "God wanted you to eat something, lunch will be ready in an hour and you WILL eat with us, I'll see to it."

Dad never said a word, never apologized, nothing. That hurt the most.

Now, even all these years later, Communion is a very special time for me.

Now you know my story.





A Note from the Moderator...

The **COVID-19 crisis** continues and, barring a miracle, will continue for some time. I continue to pray for all of you who belong to our church community as well as for sisters and brothers in our broader geographical community. My **prayers** both give thanks for the many who have stepped up to help hold our community together and keep us moving forward, as well as ask for God's compassion and healing for all those who suffer from illness, grief, loneliness, exhaustion, and financial stress.

The landscape of the COVID-19 crisis has changed somewhat since Gov. Baker announced a gradual re-opening of the economy that includes permission for houses of worship to return to congregational in-person gatherings. In light of those changes, it's understandable that some of you may be anticipating our imminent return to Sunday worship services in our sanctuary. I must tell you that **the Church Council has no plans for such in-person events until at least late summer**. We are aware that a number of houses of worship returned to in-persons gatherings this past weekend. However, following the advice of the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ and the Massachusetts Council of Churches, we believe it's too soon and too risky - even with special safety measures--to gather for worship or other activities at this time. That's disappointing, I know, even for those who agree with that decision.

The Council has appointed a "**Phase Forward Task Force**," chaired by Ann-Marie Illsley, that is charged with monitoring the situation, making some decisions regarding meetings of a few persons, and making recommendations to Council regarding more significant steps toward re-opening. We will be exploring various options for gradually coming into closer contact with each other—e.g. perhaps initially gathering outside, maybe staying in our vehicles--and for providing remote options for those who are especially vulnerable to the effects of the virus. We know that even when most of us are prepared to see each other again without the medium of computer cameras, there will be those who cannot take any risks at all until perhaps a vaccine is developed. We are committed to making our phasing forward as inclusive of all participants as possible. We welcome any suggestions you may have, and we will keep you informed. I'll say more about this at our annual congregational meeting on June 14.

I also want to encourage you to attend our **spring annual meeting that will be held via Zoom on Sunday, June 14, at 10:45 a.m.** Please see the warrant included in this issue of the Courier for the detailed agenda. One among several important issues on the agenda is a proposal from the Council to **unify our pledging system**. Please see the article "Why a unified pledge?" in this issue for further explanation.

We want to **make this meeting accessible to all**, so please look for connection details in forthcoming communications. If you prefer, you may join the meeting via a simple telephone call. **Council members are available to orient anyone that needs help with how to join the meeting.** If you need such assistance, please contact our church office.

I'll fill you in on additional important matters during the congregational meeting. I hope you'll join us for worship and Virtual Fellowship Hour each Sunday and for that annual meeting on June 14.

Annual Church Meeting Warrant

June 14, 2020

In accordance with Article XIII, Church Meetings, Sec.I-B of the Christ Congregational Church, UCC, Brockton, MA Bylaws (amended on November 20, 2016); the **Annual Church Meeting** of the membership has been called for **Sunday, June 14, 2020 at 10:45 am.** The meeting will be held via Zoom and phone due to the ongoing pandemic.

- Article I To call the meeting to order.
- Article II To affirm by those attending that this Zoom meeting will serve as an official meeting. (Per Massachusetts law, an electronic meeting must be voted by the meeting members and must be unanimous for the meeting to count).
- Article III To hear and act on the minutes of the November 16, 2019 Church Meeting and the minutes of the February 16, 2020 Special Meeting.
- Article IV To hear an update from the Pastoral Search Committee.
- Article V To hear an update from the Moderator on other church matters, including our efforts to navigate through COVID-19 as safely as possible.
- Article VI To hear and act upon any reports of the Officers, Boards, Committees, Organizations, and Church Staff.
- Article VII To hear and review the Financial Reports for the Fiscal Year 2019.
- Article VIII To hear the annual report of the Endowment Trustees.
- Article IX To hear and act upon a motion to move to a unified pledge model which eliminates separate pledges for missions and the general budget.
- Article X To hear the report of the Leadership Development and Nominating Committee for Officers, Boards, Committees and Delegates for the Church year 2020-2021 and to elect persons to those positions.
- Article XI To hear and celebrate the presentation of the annual "Light of the World" award.

Article XII To hear and act upon any other business that may properly come before the membership.

Article XIII To ratify, either individually or jointly, any action taken by the membership at this meeting in accordance with Article XIII, Section 3C of the church bylaws.

Article XIV To adjourn the Annual Church Meeting.

Why a unified pledge?

At our June 14 annual meeting, the Church Council will ask the congregation to approve a proposal to change from a dual pledge system to a unified pledge system. With this change pledgers would commit to one amount for the church instead of committing separately to one amount for Missions and another amount to Current Expenses (i.e. the General Fund). This article will explain the proposed change, and then discuss some of the key reasons the Council believes it's important to take this step.

Currently, the Board of Missions' budget amounts to the actual funds received that are designated by the donors for Missions, either through their Missions category pledge or an unpledged offering for which they note their desire to have the funds go to Missions. In FY 2019, the total funds received that were so designated was \$18,836. As expected by the congregation, the Board of Missions directs a significant portion of this amount to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) Basic Support, which helps sustain the conference and national programs and missions of our United Church of Christ denomination. In 2019, CCC's contribution to OCWM Basic Support was \$10,000. The Board of Missions then decides how to spend the remaining funds entrusted to it directly by the donors. In 2019, that amount was \$8,836. The vast majority of those funds were donated to various local, national, and international organizations that reflect the mission values and purposes our congregation wishes to promote in the world outside of our church building.

Under the proposed change, pledgers would no longer designate one amount to "Current Expenses" and another amount to "Missions." Instead they would commit to giving one total combined amount to the church. Funds for OCWM Basic Support would be budgeted under the Council, now consolidated with other funds we give annually for Conference Membership Dues. (For accounting purposes, Basic Support and these dues already appear under the Council in our 2020 Budget.) The budget for the Board of Missions, which now would not include the responsibility for Basic Support, would be decided as part of the overall budget process, like other boards and committees. The amount would be approved by the Council and then taken to the congregation for a vote in our November annual meeting. In the current motion adopted by the Council on May 21, the church would commit, as a transitional step, to keeping the 2021 Board of Missions budget the same as the non-Basic Support amount pledged for 2020, which is \$7,950.

So, why does the Council propose this change? Here are a few of the key reasons, briefly stated.

- It's an ecclesiastical issue; that is, it's about how we conceptualize our church community. With the dual pledge, the congregation left it up to individual households to determine how much the church would budget for the Board of Missions. A unified pledge requires the congregation to collectively make those decisions. It reinforces our covenant with each other to share our resources and to act together in this world as the Body of Christ.
- 2. It's a question too of how we define "missions." The current structure implies that our missions are confined to the donations we make to external organizations. Our mission, however, is much broader, and should encompass how our paid staff and our parishioners engage with the world, how we use our building and assets for missions, how we work with other churches and organizations in our community, near and far. Under a unified pledge system, our budget process will repeatedly and more explicitly nudge us as a collective body to define who we are, what our mission is, and how we prioritize our resources to fulfill our mission. Primarily for these first two reasons, our U.C.C. conference staff have recommended the change to a unified pledge. Fewer churches today stay with the dual pledge system.
- 3. Some members have expressed concern that we'll reduce our financial commitment to missions as budget pressures build. That's understandable, and it's possible that would happen. It's also possible that our mission spending will be more, perhaps different, perhaps more specific to our newly embraced strategic pathways of community engagement and racial justice. It's true that a unified pledge will require us to trust each other to remain faithful to our calling and to more intentionally express that calling through our collective financial decisions. The Council believes we're ready for such a challenge.
- 4. There are also some accounting advantages of moving to a unified pledge. Perhaps, the most important change would be that, with a unified pledge, the Board of Missions budget and spending would appear in the General Fund where all other activities supported by pledged income are budgeted and recorded. Currently, the Board of Missions accounting is somewhat obscured in the Non-General Fund ledger.

Moving to a unified budget has been discussed for several years. The Council believes this is a good time to make that change--as we take a hard look at our finances for the long-run; as we challenge ourselves with new, mission-focused, strategic pathways; and as we hope for the arrival of a new settled senior pastor sometime in the not-so-distant future. This article is a brief attempt to better prepare the congregation for your consideration and vote on June 14. There's more that could be said.
