### PASTOR'S PAGE

This will be the last courier article I write as your Bridge Pastor. At the end of this month, Pastor Jeff will begin his time with our congregation as our next settled Pastor. At that point, I will step back into a role similar to the one I held before this interim period, focusing primarily on faith formation. It is an exciting time of new beginnings for this church and for all of you who make the church a living breathing thing.

Do you remember all those months ago when we began this leg of our journey? We sang Woyaya (*we are going… heaven knows where we are going… but we know within…*) together in worship and talked about what it meant to travel into the wilderness with one another as a community. Little did we know what the coming months would bring. This has definitely been a different sort of interim period than any of us had imagined.



But this hasn't stopped our congregation from continuing its journey of faith. We've explored what it means to Be The Church, even and especially when we can't be *in* the church. We've found new ways to worship together from a distance, to share in communion at many different tables, to join in singing hymns from our different zip codes. Our community has stepped up to care for one another with calls, cards, flower deliveries, postcards and driveway visits. Oh and the masks! These and so many other things Staff and lay leaders both have teamed up to creatively find ways to continue our life and call as a church.

We are blessed at Christ Congregational Church to have strong and committed lay leaders (aka all of you) who have risen to meet the many challenges of these past months. You have done important work during this interim period. You have bid a loving farewell to a longtime pastor and supported each other in the sadness of that transition. You have discerned the areas that God is calling this congregation to boldly step into. You have asked and pondered hard questions about how we can be safe together, our focus and our finances. You have held together through tough moments and worked towards authentic and caring communication with each other even in the midst of conflict. You have searched for and called a wonderful pastor to guide and serve this congregation in its next chapter.

This hasn't been an easy time to be the church (*it will be hard we know... and the road will be muddy and rough...*). We haven't always gotten it right on the first try or done this perfectly (as anyone who's seen my accidental bloopers in online worship knows). But God does not ask us to be perfect, God asks us to be faithful. And you, my friends, have been faithful. It has been a true blessing and privilege for me to serve you as Bridge Pastor during these last ten months. I have loved seeing God's Spirit move through this community and look forward with joy and hope as our congregation welcomes Pastor Jeff and his family and continues together on its journey (*and we'll get there...we know we will...woyaya!*).

# **CHRISTIAN EDUCATION YOUTH NEWS**

This has been a year of changes and adaptations and adjustments for everyone. Over the past few weeks, teachers, students, families, and all who support them have been working hard to engage in learning in a variety of creative ways. This has created challenges certainly, but in some places has also revealed new opportunities that were previously unknown or unexplored.

Our Board of Christian Education has been working in the past weeks and months to figure out how we can offer opportunities for our folks of all ages to learn and deepen their faith. Recently, we invited parents and anyone else interested to brainstorm with us. One of the questions we asked was what they valued about Christian Education... what were the essential things they wanted their children and youth to access. We know that many families are feeling stressed and overwhelmed right now. But we also believe that our faith has much to offer us around building resilience, finding strength and comfort in God's love and caring for one another through difficult times. #### FROM THE ORGAN COMPLETION COMMITTEE

#### UPDATE FROM OUR ORGAN BUILDER: CZELUSNIAK & DUGAL

Since the resumption of a full and regular work schedule earlier this summer, by our suppliers as well as in our shop, we have remained busy and solvent as a company, most gratefully. Still, our work load and daily obligations have been a continual juggle, as the supply and demand of tuning and service work, prevailing projects and their deadlines, new business, and the support of collaborating colleagues all change on a daily, if not hourly, basis. Still, we are making headway on your Choir Division project, despite some continuing delays in that work.

**PIPEWORK**: As for responsibilities wholly under our control, we have completed the shop preparation of all pipework for the Choir division, now including treatment of the Cromorne reed pipes and the application of new slide-tuners to to all pipes needing them, as those custom parts came to us from their manufacturer.

WINDBOX: Shopwork has proceeded forward, albeit slowly, on the factory construction of the new windbox and regulator, windchest, and playing actions for the Choir division of the organ. The pictures below show the construction progress on those parts, as of early September; more work has

continued since.

At left is the special toeboard to support the winding and speech of the first 20 notes of the Choir Lieblich Gedeckt 16-8' unit rank.

At right are the rest of the toeboards for other stops on the new Choir main windchest, during manufacture, and prior to the finishing of the wood (as in the prior picture). Take note, on the far right, of the

special toeboard for the Choir Cymbel III stop, from which three pipes speak for each note played. This is how those pipes will stand and are winded to speak.





At left is the frame of the Choir main windchest being assembled. The wide board showing many holes, straight ahead, is the wall of the chest to which will be attached each of the 61 individual note-playing actions. Each of the 11 stop-action motors will operate from the wide wall of the chest to the right side of the picture.

Pictured at right is the construction on the floor of the windbox that forms the base – the foundation – of the

Choir windchest as it will be installed in the organ chamber in Brockton. In fact, this framework will sit right on top of the organ-blower box already in the chamber; the wind supply for the Choir division will be piped directly from the blower line beneath up into this box.

This evocative, Spirit-filled, stirring photo of the CCC chancel is replete with images of trees and crosses. (How many variations can you discern?) 

#### A note from the Moderator

The past month has been a challenging one at Christ Congregational Church as church leaders made the difficult decision to terminate the employment of our Facilities Manager and as members of our congregation differed in opinion about how to best inform our faith community of that action. It is important to acknowledge the pain and sadness generated by both the action itself as well as the differences of perspective on the communication.

It is also important to recognize the honest and fruitful way you discussed these issues during our two open congregational conversations and in one-to-one talks with me, our Bridge Pastor, and members of the Personnel Committee. From my standpoint, it seemed that participants of all viewpoints spoke with passion, compassion and insight while you also listened to others with respect, interest, and appreciation. For that I am deeply grateful; it is an encouraging indicator of the wisdom, maturity, and care that help hold our community together. I hope you feel similarly.

While I believe that healing has begun through this process, I don't assume that it is complete or that we should just move on as though everything is 100% hunky-dory again. While taking care not to re-open wounds that are actually on the mend, let's continue to be aware of places where healing may still be needed, and to respond--when appropriate and invited--with listening, understanding and support. I invite anyone who would like to converse further with me or others who signed the letter to the congregation to let us know. We would be glad to discuss any questions or concerns you may still have.

#### **From the Pastoral Search Committee**

Exciting times indeed! In July we welcomed Pastor Jeff Kardisco for a candidating weekend. We hosted several 'meet and greet' events on Saturday, July 25- a morning Zoom gathering for those unable to meet in person; an afternoon socially distanced picnic where Pastor Jeff, Dani, their son Ivyn, and Dani's parents circulated among the masked attendees to answer questions and converse; and a late afternoon outdoor meeting of Council and committee members where Pastor Jeff offered more details about himself, his mission, and his hopes for our Beloved Community.

On Sunday July 26 <sup>th</sup> we worshiped as a congregation, in person for the first time since Covid restrictions began. Our service was live streamed as well. Pastor Jeff led Worship, offering a meaningful message, as all in attendance discerned if the PSC's choice of settled pastor was going to be a good fit. Following Worship, a meeting was held prior to the congregational vote. Votes were received in person, via text message, via telephone, and via Zoom link in order to allow all who wished to participate an opportunity to weigh in. Our candidate, Pastor Jeff Kardisco, was unanimously approved by all participating voting members, to be called as our next settled pastor. Praise God!!!

Pastor Jeff begins his time with us Monday, October 26<sup>th</sup>; his first worship service will be November 1<sup>st</sup>, All Saints Day. The PSC and the Phasing Forward Task Force are determining best practices for this welcoming weekend, both for Sunday worship as well as a socially distanced welcome gathering. (A column on Visual Arts by Katrina Clinton)


#### PERSPECTIVE:
