PASTOR'S PAGE

"I raise my eyes toward the mountains. Where will my help come from? My help comes from the LORD, the maker of heaven and earth." Psalm 121:1-2

Recently I was in a clergy meeting where we were all checking in with one another and I heard a colleague say, "It's just nice to feel like we're moving toward something rather than simply hanging on." I really appreciated that remark, because I've felt that too. Psalm 121 is a Psalm



about moving toward something, with God's help. Most people are familiar with these first two verses, but further on the Psalm says that God will not let your foot slip and won't fall asleep on the job. It concludes by saying in verse 8, "The LORD will protect you on your journeys – whether going or coming – from now until forever from now." That's an active God working with us through all things, keeping our hope alive.

Although we have been socially distanced for much of my time here we have been moving, and active, with God's help – and I can see hope in the mountains. Over the course of the past few months, our finance and property board have been active, with help from the ministry support task force, to consider ways for our congregation to not only increase our revenue capability (to help with our budget) but to also adhere to our mission and strategic pathways. To that end we are working on an agreement with the Brockton Interfaith Community to possibly expand their office space in our building, while they have offered to contribute to our building costs by paying rent. We have also had conversations with Gregory Rose, of Rose conservatory, to explore what might be possible in a working relationship with his organization. We have also continued to expand our in person worship and activities, including Sunday morning nursery care - and VBS will be happening in August with a big and energetic rally day set for September. We are slowly regathering, moving toward something, and it is only by God's help.

It is a blessing to be in this moment, together, as a beloved community. As we all take a deep breath this summer may we remember

that God is in that deep breath, in the relaxation and joy of being around friends and loved ones again, and in all the small things we can start to enjoy again. But let us also remember that God was with us during the difficult times too – because that's the constant. The Psalmist says that he turns his eyes to the hills to find his help – eternal and never changing hills – to which the response is that God is even more constant than those. May it be so for you, and for all of God's children.

Notes from Murray

Music and its healing power. I recently visited my dad who is not doing well. My dad suffered a cognitive loss about two and a half years ago and has been steadily declining since. He has been in a hospital bed at his home for the last three months. It is expected that he won't leave the bed under his own power again. It is heartbreaking.

As most of you know, my mom passed away in December. I was fortunate to see her in her final days and spend meaningful time with her soon before. Both of my parents were musicians in their own rights. My mom had the real talent, but my dad was no slouch and was an experienced choral director and a fine high baritone voice. I sang duets with both of my parents while in high school and college and would give my right arm if I could locate any of those old recordings. My extended family were musical, as well. Notably, my paternal grandmother was a singer and played piano and guitar. She taught many children in their Phoenix neighborhood their first music lessons. One particular young person she influenced went on to become one of the most successful

song writers of the 60's, 70's and 80's. His name was Bobby Harshman, but he is known as Bobby Hart. In his memoir, *Psychedelic Bubble Gum*, he says of my grandma, "...Leota [Kidd] could well have been another Tammy Wynette or Loretta Lynn. She had that kind of sincere, pure, soulful Oklahoma voice that cut through the evening air and made you feel the truth in every emotion she sang."

While visiting my dad last week, I got to hear Grandma's old guitar again; a Gibson L-3 (around 1925) that was refurbished about 15 years ago. My son, Eddie, played it a bit and was impressed with its craftsmanship. As he played it, I was taken back to times when my grandma played and sang to me. In her older years, she still sang with the same conviction and sincerity (and intonation!).

Both she and my father suffered or suffer from a brain disease in their old age. Realizing this sort of thing can be hereditary, I am aware of the possibility of this situation in my own future. I am convinced that their condition was staved off because of their involvement in music. Even as they started to decline, music still ran strongly through their lives. On a recent zoom call, my brother and I sang a few songs to Dad and he sang along, even though he could not hold a conversation. He still knew Amazing Grace (all of the verses!) and a few other old hymns. While visiting him last week, he wasn't able to sing with me when I sang some songs to him. This broke my heart, but I am healed by the memory of making music with him and others in my family; the recollections I have of generations singing, playing together. I remember singing in the church choir with my Uncle Marshal, a stalwart bass. He was the first to encourage me to sight read other parts besides the melody. My cousin, Denny, taught me (for far too short a period) piano. My maternal grandfather sang in the choir well into his 80's and I sang alongside him. My mom learned piano from my great aunt, Melita. She, Melita, taught almost all of my older cousins and aunts and uncles. My father, his sister (my aunt Chris) and I sang trios at church on many occasions. My brother and I sing in his church or my church whenever we are in the same city. I am so fortunate to be able to see my own sons making music and it only compliments their other interests. Making music with my wife and kids is a joy that will not be surpassed.

I can choose to worry about the possibility of a brain development or health situation or I can try to make the most of my time, remembering the amazing times of music making and other special events until I can no longer do so. Also, I am aware that I have much more music to make before that might happen. I know that if that time comes, those who are aware of the decline will be comforted by the music in their hearts and memory whether it be of their own family or friends or their favorite artists. God gave us music and music heals.

INFORMATION SESSIONS ABOUT ANN-MARIE'S ORDINATION PROCESS

In May of 2021 the Pilgrim Association Committee on Ministry approved an alternative path to ordination for Pastor Ann-Marie Illsley, our associate pastor. The Pilgrim Association told us that they would approve Pastor Ann-Marie for ordination in her current position with our church, but only after we had undergone a congregational process that ended with a congregational vote on whether or not to officially call Pastor Ann-Marie as our part time associate pastor. If the vote were to be affirmative - which according to our by-laws requires a 2/3 vote of those gathered - they would approve her to be ordained and we would begin plans with the association to hold an ordination service. If the vote were to result in our not calling Ann-Marie she would still be allowed to stay in her position, but she would not be ordained until she receives a call from another congregation.

The Board of Christian Education voted unanimously at their June meeting to ask council to proceed toward such a congregational vote, and in turn council unanimously agreed to bring the question of Pastor Ann-Marie's call to a congregational vote. The date for this congregational meeting to discuss and vote on Pastor Ann-Marie's call is not yet set, because we wanted to allow time for a process of conversation and information sharing to take place among our Beloved Community.

To that end, we'd like to let everyone know of a series of information sessions we've planned that will include our moderator (Sue Koza), the chair of our Christian Education Board (Michelle Young-Ferguson), Pastor Jeff, and Ann-Marie. Please make note of the dates below and please plan to attend as many of these sessions as you'd like. No signup will be required. The meetings will be held in person, but we will also have a Zoom option for those who wish to participate virtually.

Welcome to Summer!!

Your Stewardship team is working on our plans for the Fall pledge drive for 2022. While we finalize our theme, I wanted to touch base on our pledges for 2021, and your privacy. Our pledges are tracked by the pledge form that you submit to the office. In years past, you may have mailed your form in, or left your pledge envelope in the offering plate during our service.

This past year, it was not quite so simple. With no in person service, pledges had to be mailed back. Any total pledge amounts that I have referenced in the past 8 months are based upon returned pledge forms. If you have been pledging regularly to the Church, but did not submit a pledge form, your pledge is not counted in our total, (although it certainly counts!!) Hopefully we will be able to track our pledges in the fall a little better with our in-person worships.

Regarding privacy; your Church pledge is your business, and nobody else's. When you send in a pledge form or put your pledge envelope in the offering plate, it is only seen by our bookkeeper Jen, who inputs it into the Church record for accounting purposes. We as a committee do not know any amounts of any individual pledges that are submitted (we do not want to know. It is not our business to know). During pledge season, Jen (our bookkeeper) sends me, as Chair of Stewardship, a cumulative amount of where we stand in our pledge drive, and how many pledges have been received. This may seem like a superfluous explanation of what happens, but we think it is important for you to know that your financial privacy is as important to your Stewardship team as it is to you. If you ever have any questions, you can always reach out to us.


