PASTOR'S PAGE

Dear Friends,

This year for Advent we're following a worship series called The Inn: Housing the Holy. The entire premise is that our hearts, our minds, our very church – these are all sacred spaces where God is hoping to meet us. These spaces, just like the streets and inns of Bethlehem at the time of Jesus' birth, can be crowded and over busy. That can make it hard to house the holy.



Hope. Peace. Joy. Love. These are the candles we light at Advent. The connection I've made for this Advent season, with the help of our series materials, is that these building blocks of God's Kin-dom are also the feelings that make our hearts expand... which leads to more room! We have been through a lot since the beginning of last Advent. We have also accomplished a lot since the beginning of last Advent. I firmly believe that with all we've been through, and all we've accomplished, there's no way we'd be where we are right now without Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love.

Paul closes his letter to the Philippians by trying to encourage them to keep living according to the gospel, because it's been a hard road for them but they're a community with so much promise. He writes in Philippians 4:8-9, "From now on, siblings, if anything is excellent and if anything is admirable, focus your thoughts on these things: all that is true, all that is holy, all that is just, all that is pure, all that is lovely, and all that is worthy of praise. Practice these things; whatever you learned, received, heard, or saw in us. The God of peace will be with you."

This year, with our hearts set on opening the door and housing the holy in our midst, let's shorten this instruction to say simply, "Focus on Hope, focus on Peace, focus on Joy, and focus on Love – because that's where God can be most easily found." Friends, I pray that you find God in new and exciting ways during this Advent season – and that you will share your findings with

the world.

Notes from Murray

O come, o come Emmanuel! Comfort ye, my people. People, look east. Christmas is coming! Advent is upon us and the wait begins. Well, I don't know about you, but it started long before now. Advent is a time of great anticipation. What have we done for the poor ones? What have we done for the poor ones, the hungry, the outcast? The Chancel Choir will not produce a Christmas Concert this year, due to many reasons related to this current time we are in. The choir will be caroling within our beloved community. You are welcome to join us! We will be caroling on December 18th, starting at 5:00pm and going to about 7:00. We will finish off with some hot chocolate and conversation in the fellowship hall.

Getting to Know You! Rather, getting to know Steve Young! We are blessed to have our new organist with us and have enjoyed his lively postludes! Due to Covid, we are not able to hold our normal fellowship hour after church, so we thought it might be a good idea to have a little question and answer time in this month's Courier. My

apologies, as I am not Terry Gross, so the questions are a bit basic. Thank you, Steve, for your patience and helping us get to know you. I hope everyone takes the time to welcome Steve, if you haven't already.

- 1. Where are you originally from?
- While I was born in Everett, I have spent the majority of my life in Southeastern MA. I am a local.
- 2. How long have you played the organ and was it your first instrument? I have been playing the organ since I was 16. I took a couple of years of piano lessons, but switched to organ early on. A decision I have never regretted!.
 - 3. How long have you taught at Bridgewater State University?

I have been at Bridgewater as long as I can remember. I started in 1985 as accompanist to the College Chorale. Two years later, I began teaching as an adjunct faculty member, and in 1998 I was offered the position I now hold. So, in terms of years, I will let you do the math! Suffice it to say I am old!

- 4. Do you have a favorite piece of music or one that is your favorite currently?
- As a performer, there is so much music I like. It is impossible to narrow it down to one piece. My favorite pieces to play come from the late French Romantic tradition, with works by Guilmant, Widor, and Vierne. But I also love the music of Bach and Buxtehude. I am currently preparing apiece by Camillo Schumann, a German Romantic composer which I enjoy practicing.
- 5. Besides our organ here (ahem), what and where is the organ you would say is your favorite? Have you played it recently? I have had many wonderful opportunities to play instruments across the country and around the globe. I thoroughly enjoyed playing the 18th century French organ at the cathedral of Sens, France as well as the marvelous organ at National City Christian Church in Washington, D.C. My other favorite is the beautiful Helmut Wolff organ at the University of Kansas, Lawrence. I haven't had the opportunity to play any of these in recent years.
- 6. How did music become your career? Did you know from an early age you would do it for your life?

 Once I fell in love with the organ in high school, I decided to major in music. I always assumed I would spend my career as an organist/choir director. Once I started teaching, I was encouraged to pursue the doctoral degree. It was there I developed my interest in musicology. One thing led to another and…here I am.
- 7. As you mention, you have a doctorate in music. What is the topic of your dissertation on?

 My dissertation was on the non-organ music of Louis Vierne. Many had written about his outstanding organ music, so I chose a different path. His chamber, vocal, and instrumental music is totally worth exploring. It also gave me insight into his organ music and his compositional style.
 - 8. Do you have a favorite movie?

I don't get to watch much television or go out to movies often. During the pandemic, I did watch more than my share. I have always been a sci-fi fan but also like comic books, so the Avengers franchise has been among my favorites.

- 9. Is there a song that you really like that might be a surprise to those who know you professionally? I came of age in the disco era, so I love the music of all those pop divas from Helen Reddy to Donna Summer and Tina Turner. Not sure there is a favorite, but whenever I hear those women sing, I return to a wonderful time in my life.
- 10. If you could have a song written to capture you as a person, is there a poem or scripture (or bumper sticker) that you would suggest the composer use to capture the essence of yourself?

I am intolerant of what I consider hatred and bigotry in all its forms. I often think of Leonard Bernstein who wrote that: "This will be our reply to violence: to make music more intensely, more beautifully, more devotedly than ever before."




Join us for Wednesday morning Bible Study group. Regulars and newcomers alike are welcome to drop in and check out this adult faith formation opportunity.
