PASTOR'S PAGE

"Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you." ~Isaiah 60:1~

Reliability. *THAT* was my star word for 2022. *RELIABILITY*! The Holy Spirit had the nerve to put the word *reliability* on my heart, to pray on and reflect on and think about... and then 2022 felt anything BUT reliable. For most of 2022 I felt unmoored and unsure – insecure in ways I'd never



felt insecure before. But, as it always goes with God and God's Spirit, we've come full circle to a new year and a new epiphany – and on Sunday we'll all get a new star word.

For those who aren't familiar with our practice of star words – on the Sunday following Epiphany each year we hand out paper stars with words on them, and the practice is meant to have you reflect prayerfully on one word throughout the coming year so that you can see what God might inspire from it. Each year when we get to this point (the week before star words go out) I always take an extra moment to reflect on the previous year's word.

This year I'm realizing my star word wasn't for me, or for me to strengthen any sort of virtue within myself. I think the Spirit knew I'd need a word like "reliability" to be reminded of just how reliable God is through God's people and Beloved Community. Sometimes star words can do that – they can inspire you to look outward. Much like the magi we celebrate at epiphany – who struck out from all that was familiar to follow a mysterious astronomical phenomenon, leading them on a long and sometimes perilous journey – this outward looking posture usually leads to miraculous discoveries.

So, if you still have your star word (whether it's prominently displayed in a visible spot, or stuffed at the bottom of your purse or wallet) I invite you to look at it and to think about all that your star word has meant for you this past year. If you don't still have it, that's completely OK too, but I invite you then to think about what you want to ask the Spirit to lead you to in the coming year. As I said on Sunday, we'll have plenty of opportunities together to move in miraculous directions in the coming year – and we can trust on God to be reliable in moving with us.

"...It was no messenger or angel but his presence that saved them; in his love and in his pity he redeemed them; he lifted them up and carried them all the days of old." ~Isaiah 63:9~



Yesterday Pastor Jeff shared part of our family's story from the past twelve weeks as we've welcomed Judah into the world, but as we've also navigated the world of medical complexity. Without getting too technical, Judah is medically complex because of a genetic difference in one of his genes that caused his kidneys to develop differently – which resulted in Judah being born with non-functioning kidneys, placing him in end-stage renal failure from the day of his birth. This has lead to many twists and turns, highs and lows, and 58 total days with Judah admitted at Boston Children's hospital – and through it all this Beloved Community has prayed for us, walked with us, cheered us on, shared meals and other tangible support, and the list goes on and on. We wanted to write to you all in this month's Courier to, above all, say thank you from the bottom of our hearts for all of the ways you have supported our family. The past 3 months have been the most difficult chapter in both of our lives, and we could not have made it through without your love and support.

We're also incredibly excited to be returning to all of you in person, to get back into the ebb and flow of congregational life and to reconnect with all of you. When you see us in person we will always be masked – because any fever that Judah would get from something he might catch will almost certainly result in a 48 hour admission to Boston Children's hospital. We don't expect the church to impose a strict mask mandate on our behalf (so folks can still continue to use their best judgement, as has been our church's policy) but Pastor Jeff will have a box of masks in his office going forward – and we ask anyone who is visiting with Pastor Jeff in his office to wear a mask to protect our family. We are also more than happy to answer any questions you have about how to best be in relationship with our family.

This congregation truly is a Beloved Community, strengthened and held together by God's grace and compassionate love. We have felt that over the past twelve weeks: Dani as she spent many nights alone at Boston Children's hospital, Jeff and Ivyn as they've gone on adventures and tried to keep things "normal", and Judah who has felt and responded to all of your prayers. It isn't hyperbole for us to say that we've experienced the literal presence of God that this passage describes, and all of you have had a part in that. Thank you, and God bless you all in this new year!

A YEAR IN FAITH FORMATION AT CCC
















And Night Shall Be No More. Happy New Year to all! We have rounded the bend and the days are gradually getting longer. As we start our journey toward Easter (April 9th), Lent (Feb. 23) is right around the corner. We have just passed the most sublime of seasons - Advent - and are within the twelve days of Christmas. Epiphany is January 6, when we celebrate the journey of the wise ones to see the baby, Jesus. This is when we focus on the journey from darkness to light. The choir had the privilege of singing one of the all time masterpieces of choral literature on Christmas Eve, E'en So Lord Jesus, Quickly Come. The sanctuary was near full with current members and many newcomers or those we haven't seen for a while. Paul (composer) and Ruth (poet) Manz wrote this piece when their child was deathly ill. They were at a very low point in the situation when the words from Revelation came to Ruth. The couple believes strongly that the child survived by the power of prayer. The text toward the end of the anthem is extremely poignant:

"E'en so Lord Jesus, quickly come, And night shall be no more; They need no light nor lamp nor sun, For Christ will be their all.

Night shall be no more. As we have celebrated the birth of Jesus and his advent on Earth, we would do well to turn our eyes and hearts toward his teachings and the light he has brought to us. I know the choir enjoyed preparing this anthem and thinking of these words several times during the Advent season as we heard the worst of headlines of the world; Ukraine, Buffalo, Indiana, and so many more devastating events. As we go into the period of Ordinary Time which leads to the 40 days of Lent, don't forget to turn often to Jesus as the most profound of examples of faith and courage during the most troubled time. Take time to contemplate His journey and his calling: to open the eyes of the blind, to bring out prisoners from the dungeon. As we venture forth into the New Year, let us be free from the dungeon of our busy lives and look to the light that God has created. Let us do this frequently and with wonder!

Here is a lovely recording of the anthem by Paul and Ruth Manz. Feel free to listen and meditate on the words.

Thank you to all of those who participated in the music of the Advent season and the beautiful Christmas Eve service. We hope many more will consider raising their voices, including the young and young at heart! 




