PASTOR'S PAGE

I'm excited to celebrate Rally Day this year with our first baseball Sunday at Christ Congregational Church – and it's hard to believe it's only a week away! Growing up I had the privilege to live just a few miles down the road from the complex where the Little League World series is played every summer. For those who aren't familiar it's a tournament in South Williamsport that includes 8 teams from the United States and 8 teams from around the world, all comprised of 11 and 12 year olds who played for their town's all star



team, and these 16 teams play baseball in front of a world stage.

Growing up I remember the experience – there's a huge hill just outside the outfield wall that's awesome for sliding down on cardboard boxes, and the games don't charge any admission just like any other Little League game. Hotdogs are a dollar and the atmosphere is always fun – but what's always struck me most about the Little League world series is the camaraderie among the players. International players and US players alike all stay in dorms on the grounds of the complex, and so they aren't only playing baseball against one another on game days but they're living together and sharing meals while they aren't playing; but there's also a deep tradition among those who are fortunate to make it to the tournament. Each team has a pin that represents their country or region, and each player has a bunch of the pins as they arrive in Williamsport – and one of the favorite traditions among the players is to trade pins with one another throughout the tournament to see if they can get a pin from each team represented. I've always thought that tradition brings into focus the reason we do anything like playing baseball or other hobbies - because they bring us together.

Watching professional baseball players can make the game seem almost automatic, because the margin for error in the game of baseball is so small – and to get to that level means you've really almost perfected some of the elements of the game – but watching the Little League World series over the years I'm always reminded that perfection isn't why people watch or play baseball... they play to have an experience together. That becomes clear when opposing players in the Little League World Series console one another in loss and congratulate one another in their success – because they're all there to succeed, and to celebrate together. As we celebrate baseball Sunday, Rally Day, and pick up where we left off for a new program year I hope we can all encourage one another and remember that we don't get together in church to achieve perfection – but to experience growth together, and to celebrate together when it happens.

Hello, Beloved Community.

As the dog days of summer have arrived and we look forward to cooler temperatures and the change of seasons, I am excited for what is in store not just for our young folks regarding faith formation, but also our adults. Stay tuned to the Nearly Weekly and announcements for adult faith formation opportunities this fall.

On Sunday, September 3rd all students, teachers, staff, and bus drivers are invited to bring their backpacks, school bags, and blankies to be blessed during worship before you start your new school year.

Sunday, September 10th will be a FUN day of baseball themed worship followed by fellowship with a hot dog lunch, ice cream, activities, and CCC's first annual kids vs adults wiffleball game! This is a time for our beloved community to come back together after our summer adventures to celebrate the beginning of a new church year! All are welcome, invite a friend!

Regular Sunday School will begin Sunday, September 17th. Families are welcome to sit with their children during the first part of worship in the Prayground and then children will be dismissed to Sunday School after the Time for All Ages. Feel free to grab a Worship Tool Box at the beginning of the service or color at the prayground tables. There will be no supervision at the Prayground, except during intergenerational worship on the first Sunday of the month.

This fall we will be using the VBS curriculum, Changemakers Lab during Sunday School. We will learn how we can be changemakers in our communities and world by learning about different people in the Bible who were changemakers. Each week will have an activity from STEAM (science, technology, engineering, art, or math) and a SNACK! This is for children Kindergarten-5th grade. Nursery is available during the service starting at 9:45am for ages 0-PreK.

This summer we used the prayground as a way for children to connect to the message each Sunday by creating reminders to take home of what God wants us to do and be. They made suncatchers, mixed media art, cross ornaments, bracelets, prayer beads, lacing art, luchador masks to remind us to surrender to God when we are struggling, and of course the fan favorite: playdoh!

My prayer this month is for all the families adjusting to the change from a less structured summer to the rigor of back to school. May all have peaceful hearts and know that they are loved, valued, and known by our Almighty Creator.


For those interested, let me add a little context to this invitation. I know that some of you did not know about the bells when I announced this event in church on August 27. First, a quick Christ Congregational Church history lesson for relative newcomers (like myself). Our congregation was born in the 1980s with the merger of four congregational churches in Brockton. Over time the four church buildings were sold and our current church building was built in the 1990s. One of the four original congregations was First Parish which was located in the downtown area and had a well-known bell tower and carillon. That building was sold in 1983 to Mount Moriah Baptist Church. That sale excluded the bells, however, since many of the bells had been memorial gifts and First Parish members hoped they could be moved when CCC settled into a new building. But for several reasons—moving costs, zoning ordinances, etc.—the bells remained in their original location. Over the years intermittent CCC proposals to resolve the issue were repeatedly followed by periods of inattention. About three years ago renewed discussions led to a proposal that we give the bells to Mount Moriah.

The congregation approved that transfer of ownership in November 2021. It then took a little while to draw up the legal documents to establish Mount Moriah's ownership... 40 years after the original

sale.

Earlier this summer Brenda and I visited Mount Moriah to deliver those documents. We had a wonderful meeting with Gwen Hickman, church administrator, and Rev. Eugene Neville, now retired. who was Mount Moriah's pastor when the building was sold. Their current pastor, Cedric Rucker, was unable to ioin us because of his correctional social services job. During that conversation, mutual interest arose regarding possibilities of exchanges between our two congregations. Ms. Hickman and Rev. Neville extended this invitation to the "Awaken to Worship" event as such an opportunity.







We are hoping to reestablish a Collation Committee, please reach out to Keith Allen, Deana in the church office, or Pastor Jeff if you are able to help.

The work would involve setting the food tables with tablecloths and serving utensils; placing food (provided by the family) onto the food tables; assisting with serving the food; and cleaning up afterwards.

Providing a Collation for our grieving families is one way of offering comfort and support to those in our Beloved Community.

A Note From The Moderator

I hope you all had an amazing summer! Since June, our church community shared time together during services, said good-bye to music director, Murray Kidd and accompanist Anton Faynberg, and saw some lovely Rose Conservatory camp days. culminating in what promises to be an AMAZING Rally Day and Baseball Sunday! A busy summer to be sure!

As I embark upon my term as your moderator, I have been reflecting on what it means to serve you in this capacity, my goals for the next two years and what it means to be a part of a Beloved Community. To me, a Beloved Community is one that loves unconditionally. It recognizes that each person is unique in the gifts they offer, their background, and how their bodies and minds work. It then strives to create a welcoming, equitable, accepting, and accessible place that shines God's love on all.

To help our Beloved Community operate at its best, I would like to focus my time and efforts in four key areas: 1) Using our gifts and respecting our time 2) Experiencing the Beloved Community 3) Caring for those inside and outside our walls and 4) Building upon our foundations.

Using our Gifts and Respecting our Time- Have you ever been overwhelmed by the idea of joining a committee? Or are on a committee but are interested in the work of another? We will consider how best to share our gifts so that we can love, experience, and support each other while feeling less of the dreaded "committee burn out".

Experiencing the Beloved Community- From a young age I have felt the love and light of our Beloved Community. Some of my favorite memories from childhood are going to VBS and Sunday School with my friends, singing in the Junior Choir, and helping my dad set up Communion. As I grew up, I went through confirmation and Senior High Youth Group with those same friends and after college became an adult leader for the next generation of Senior High Youth Group kids. These experiences are a large part of why I am still an active member of our congregation. This community loved me and gave me a safe place to discover who I am and what I believe. As a congregation we have a unique place in each other's lives where we can offer and create these spaces and discover ourselves in Christ.

Caring for those inside and outside our walls- In the Commonwealth of Massachusetts 1/3 of people, almost 2.3 million, struggle with food insecurity. We will strengthen ourselves as partners in the common wealth, ensuring that our pantry, already full of food, is accessible to our Beloved Community whether they be inside or outside the walls of this church.

Building upon our Foundations- Understanding our traditions and foundations is important to who we are as a community. We look back to discover precedent and to identify where we came from. To better understand our congregational heritage, we will spend time studying, researching, organizing, and preserving documents and artifacts stored in the church building. These actions will allow us to preserve the foundations of our Beloved Community.

The term Beloved Community was popularized by Martin Luther King Jr. who said, "The end is reconciliation; the end is redemption; the end is the creation of Beloved Community. It is this type of spirit and this type of love that can transform opponents into friends." Join me friends as we build pillars of love and spirit on the foundations of this Beloved Community.
